1 THE IRISH WASHERWOMAN

If there is one tune that announces the stereotype of *Irishness* it is *The Irish Washerwoman*. Used as background music for performances of every kind, from the stage-Irish caricature of Old Mother Riley in Music Hall days to the famous 'Irish' movie *The Quiet Man* starring John Wayne, it has long been the best known of all Irish jigs. Yet, in spite of apparent over-exposure, it remains perennially popular with fiddlers and was recorded as recently as 1991 by Paddy Glackin on his album *In Full Spate* (Gael-Linn CEFCD153). The bowing here is one-stroke-to-a-note. The two quavers before the first bar-line (known as *pick-up* notes) are not accented.
